CCRC Working Paper Thomas Bailey, Dong Wook Jeong, Sung-Woo Cho, 2008 After being assessed many students entering community colleges are referred to one or more levels of developmental education While the need to assist students with weak academic skills is well known little research has examined student progression through multiple levels of developmental education and into entry level college courses The purpose of this paper is to analyze the patterns and determinants of student progression through sequences of developmental education starting from initial referral We rely primarily on a micro level longitudinal

dataset that includes detailed information about student progression through developmental education This dataset was collected as part of the national community college initiative Achieving the Dream Community Colleges Count The dataset has many advantages but it is not nationally representative therefore we check our results against a national dataset the National Education Longitudinal Study of 1988 Our results indicate that only 3 to 4 out of 10 students who are referred to remediation actually complete the entire sequence to which they are referred Most students exit in the beginning of their developmental sequence almost half fail to complete the first course in their sequence The results also show that more students exit their developmental sequences because they did not enroll in the first or a subsequent course than because they failed a course in which they were enrolled We also show that men older students Black students part time students and students in vocational programs are less likely to progress through their full remedial sequences Finally we provide weaker evidence that some institutional characteristics are related to a lower probability of completion of developmental education Contains 7 tables and 7 figures

operated at three of six community colleges participating in the National Center for Postsecondary Research's NCPR Learning Communities Demonstration. The demonstration's focus is on determining whether Learning Communities are an effective strategy for helping students who have been referred to developmental education. The setting of this research is Hillsborough Community College, Queensborough Community College, and Houston Community College. Findings from these three Learning Communities Demonstration sites are as follows: 1. Hillsborough's fairly basic Learning Communities model did not have a meaningful impact on students' academic success in terms of likelihood of completing developmental reading, average total credits attempted, earned, and rates of persistence. 2. Both Houston's and Queensborough's Learning Communities programs showed evidence of helping students progress through the developmental math sequence more quickly. 3. Houston's and Queensborough's Learning Communities programs both did not show evidence of lasting impacts on credit accumulation or retention. Contains 2 tables.

The Massachusetts Community Colleges Developmental Education Best Policy and Practice Audit Charmian Sperling, 2009. The purpose of this study, funded by Jobs for the Future through a grant to the Massachusetts Community Colleges Executive Office, was to: 1. provide an update on the status of developmental education within Massachusetts community colleges; 2. shed light on the alignment between research-based best practices to advance success among developmental learners and the practices and policies currently in use with Massachusetts community colleges; and 3. provide relevant recommendations as well as a repository of Massachusetts community colleges practices and policies that advance the persistence and attainment of underprepared learners. Based upon a current best practice literature review, questionnaires were developed and then completed by individuals in the following roles at each of the 15 colleges: Chief Academic Officer, Developmental Math department chair, Developmental English department chair, Reading department chair, and a maximum of two coordinators for Special Programs serving developmental learners. Follow-up campus interviews were conducted; each included 10-20 individuals with responsibility for supporting underprepared learners at each college. The findings indicated that while college personnel feel deeply committed to developmental education and have in place a broad array of relevant courses and services, most institutions have a fragmented approach to fostering achievement among developmental learners. Programs and services that evidence the greatest impact on student success are by and large grant-funded initiatives in which clear outcomes and ongoing assessment guide practitioners in developing and refining strategies that increase student attainment and success. Successful strategies include ongoing mentoring, close coordination between instruction and support, labs, tutoring, supplemental instruction, advising, counseling, acceleration options, diagnostic assessment linked to opportunities for students to close specific gaps in learning, and learning communities that integrate instruction, aggressive reinforcement of learning, student success skills, and proactive advisement. Fifteen recommendations are offered. They include linking commitment, inquiry, intentionality, and accountability; connecting students to a coherent and interconnected set of offerings and services.

The Interpretive Process of North Carolina Community College System Developmental Education Policy at Select Community Colleges John Paul Black, 2008. The purpose of this study was to examine the interpretive processes of administrators and staff at individual community colleges in the North Carolina system. The study examines how developmental education policy established at the state level is interpreted and applied at the local community college. The study examines how administrators and staff in the North Carolina system interpret their role in serving growing numbers of new and returning college students, many underprepared for college-level work. In particular, the study looks at internal and external influences that shape the interpretive process for individual administrators and staff as they balance the influences of state legislators and state higher education authorities with local needs in serving underprepared students at the local community college. The study used a qualitative case study methodology to examine local developmental education policy at three community colleges in the North Carolina system. The study used current research on developmental education policies from a variety of states as a point of reference for the processes that take place at local community colleges in the North Carolina system. In addition, it used leadership theory to guide the study of internal organizational processes at local colleges and institutional policies at the state level. From the research conducted, I have concluded that community college administrators and staff are following a process of interpretation that considers local organizational influences, local community influences, and external institutional influences as part of a larger state system.

High Flyers Lande Ajose, Ria Sengupta Bhatt, Gagandeep Kaur, 2011. In 2010, Jobs for the Future (JFF) contracted BTW Informing Change (BTW) to conduct a study on developmental education (DevEd) practices and policies in the state of Florida. This study was undertaken with two purposes. First, JFF wanted to see what common threads could be identified among the strategies and approaches of community colleges that outperformed their peers in advancing developmental mathematics students into college-level courses. In addition to an interest in the institutional stories themselves, JFF had a second purpose.

in commissioning this research JFF has served as the state policy lead for two ambitious multi institution and multi state community college improvement efforts in the past few years Achieving the Dream ATD and the Developmental Education Initiative DEI This study used focus groups interviews and supplementary data to explore the extent to which selected colleges exhibit characteristics of DevEd success and how statewide policies may contribute to strong DevEd performance in relation to these characteristics The first part of this report is a brief on Florida s DevEd policies as seen from the perspective of state administrators college leaders and college staff The second part is a set of case studies on the practices of three community colleges in Florida that were particularly successful in serving students in need of developmental math compared to other colleges in the state during the years 2002 to 2008 Methodology for Selecting High performing Colleges is appended Individual sections contain exhibits and footnotes

Implementing Effective Policies for Remedial and Developmental Education Jan M. Ignash,1998-01-12 In 1894 forty percent of college freshmen enrolled in pre collegiate programs to prepare for regular college coursework In Fall 1995 twenty nine percent of entering freshmen enrolled in at least one remedial course The debate over the need for and appropriateness of remedial and developmental education at the postsecondary level has spanned a century The 1998 Reauthorization of the Higher Education Act has added fuel to the debate Legislators educators and the general public are asking questions and raising accountability issues Who needs remedial and developmental education Why does the need for it appear to be increasing How much does it cost Who should pay for it Are remedial and developmental programs effective Who should provide it Legislators and the public are upset over the perception that they are paying twice for the same education once in high school and once again in college Educators are concerned about the potential devaluation of higher education through the provision of large amounts of remedial and developmental education And students too are unhappy with the time and expense necessary to develop English and math skills that they should have learned in high school Each chapter of this volume addresses a specific policy question involved in the debate over remedial and developmental education and uses national and state data as well as information from case studies of individual institutions to provide insights into effective approaches to remedial and developmental education This is the one hundredth issue of the quarterly journal *New Directions for Community Colleges*
