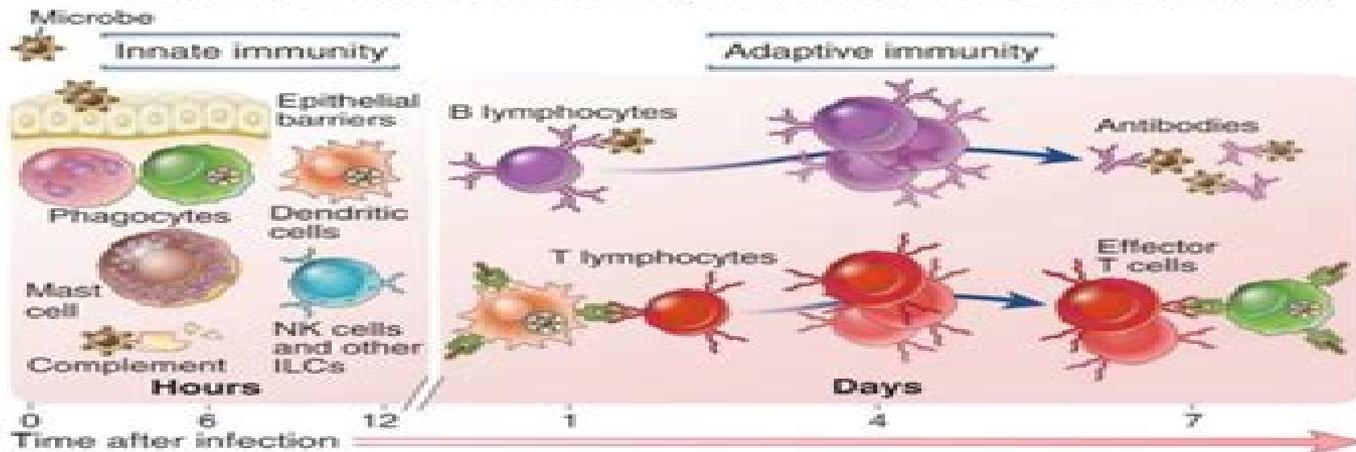

- An Immunogen (immunogenic) elicits an adaptive immune response e.g. influenza virus
- An Antigen (Ag) is a specific immune target (usually referring to recognition by adaptive cells) e.g. hemagglutinin on surface of influenza virus.
- Levels of protection from pathogens:
 - First line: Physical barriers that viruses and bacteria must cross. Skin covers and mucous membranes that line digestive, respiratory, reproductive tracts, cover ~400 m²
 - Second line: Innate immune system. Macrophages (Greek for "big eater"), neutrophils, natural killer (NK) cells, Cytokines (hormone-like proteins that mediate inflammation), Complement proteins
 - Third line (vertebrates only): Adaptive immune system, adapts to defend against specific pathogens using variable receptors.
 - B cells make antibodies, each individual B cell makes a specific antibody to a specific antigen
 - T cells mediate cellular responses using variable receptors (T cell receptors; TCRs)



- Innate Immunity:
 - Present at birth and for life
 - No specificity (i.e. can respond to many stimuli)
 - Not modified by stimulus (i.e. no memory, not enhanced on subsequent exposure)
