Reading Classes Barbara Jensen, 2012-05-15 Discussions of class make many Americans uncomfortable This accessible book makes class visible in everyday life Solely identifying political and economic inequalities between classes offers an incomplete picture of class dynamics in America and may not connect with people s lived experiences In *Reading Classes* Barbara Jensen explores the anguish caused by class in our society identifying classism or anti working class prejudice as a central factor in the reproduction of inequality in America Giving voice to the experiences and inner lives of working class people Jensen a community and counseling psychologist provides an in depth psychologically informed examination of how class in America is created and re created through culture with an emphasis on how working and middle class cultures differ and conflict This book is unique in its claim that working class cultures have positive qualities that serve to keep members within them and that can haunt those who leave them behind Through both autobiographical reflections on her dual citizenship in the working class and middle class and the life stories of students clients and relatives Jensen brings into focus the clash between the realities of working class life and middle class expectations for working class people Focusing on education she finds that at every point in their personal development and educational history working class children are misunderstood ignored or disrespected by middle class teachers and administrators Education while often hailed as a way to cross classes brings with it its own set of conflicts and internal struggles These problems can lead to a divided self resulting in alienation and suffering for the upwardly mobile student Jensen suggests how to increase awareness of the value of working class cultures to a truly inclusive American society at personal professional and societal levels [Class Cultures and Social Mobility](#) Paul Dean, 2025-11-11 *Class Cultures and Social Mobility* tells the stories of people who grew up working class became the first members of their family to graduate from college and undertook professional work that serves working class people Drawing upon personal narratives to appeal to both academics and first gen students themselves this book charts the class journeys of people across a wide range of occupational fields Their stories illustrate how members of the professional workforce draw upon their working class roots to construct meaningful careers aimed at building stability mobility and fulfillment for the next generation of working class people While their working class origins presented significant barriers along their career trajectories they also found ways to leverage their roots in their professional work Through their stories the author reveals the power of working class cultural capital how their unique knowledge skillsets and dispositions enabled them to leverage their humble beginnings as a strength for both themselves and their communities *Class Lives* Chuck Collins, Jennifer Ladd, Maynard Seider, Felice Yeskel, 2014-12-18 *Class Lives* is an anthology of narratives dramatizing the lived experience of class in America It includes forty original essays from authors who represent a range of classes genders races ethnicities ages and occupations across the United States Born into poverty working class the middle class and the owning class and every place in between the contributors describe their class journeys in narrative form

These Walls Between Us Wendy Sanford, 2021-10-05 From an author of the best selling women s health classic *Our Bodies Ourselves* comes a bracingly forthright memoir about a life long friendship across racial and class divides A white woman s necessary learning and a Black woman s complex evolution make *These Walls Between Us* a tender honest cringeworthy and powerful read Debby Irving author *Waking Up White* In the mid 1950s a fifteen year old African American teenager named Mary White now Mary Norman traveled north from Virginia to work for twelve year old Wendy Sanford s family as a live in domestic for their summer vacation by a remote New England beach Over the years Wendy s family came to depend on Mary s skilled service and each summer Mary endured the extreme loneliness of their elite white beachside retreat in order to support her family As the Black help and the privileged white daughter Mary and Wendy were not slated for friendship But years later each divorced each a single parent Mary now a rising officer in corrections and Wendy a feminist health activist they began to walk the beach together after dark talking about their children and their work and a friendship began to grow Based on decades worth of visits phone calls letters and texts between Mary and Wendy *These Walls Between Us* chronicles the two women s friendship with a focus on what Wendy characterizes as her oft stumbling efforts as a white woman to see Mary more fully and to become a more dependable friend The book examines obstacles created by Wendy s upbringing in a narrow white upper class world reveals realities of domestic service rarely acknowledged by white employers and draws on classic works by the African American writers whose work informed and challenged Wendy along the way Though Wendy is the work s primary author Mary read and commented on every draft and together the two friends hope their story will incite and support white readers to become more informed and accountable friends across the racial divides created by white supremacy and to become active in the ongoing movement for racial justice
